Hebrews 6:7-12

POINTS:

- 1. Your response to circumstances reflects an underlying condition of your heart.
- 2. Your response then generates the appropriate and inevitable retribution.

Hebrews 6:7 – "For land that has drunk the rain that often falls on it, and produces a crop useful to those for whose sake it is cultivated, receives a blessing from God."

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- 1. Key to understanding this is to know that your response to your circumstances reflects an underlying condition.
- 2. The rain is not the source of the seeds. The rain just causes the seeds to spring forth.
- 3. The sun can melt wax or harden clay. If a substances melts or hardens is not determined by the sun but by the material the sun shines on. So are our hearts.

6:8 – "But if it bears thorns and thistles, it is worthless and near to being cursed, and its end is to be burned.

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Examples of False Believers:

- 1. Simon Magus was baptized (Acts 8:13)
- 2. Demas was involved in Christian work (2 Tim. 4:9-10)
- 3. Judas was involved with healing, casting out demons (Mark 6:12; Matt. 10:5)

Isaiah's example of Israel as a vineyard in Isaiah 5 shows what worthless soil can do even in the hands of a careful gardener.

This fire is not a fire of cleansing but of judgment.

First Corinthians 3:10-23 -

"If anyone's work is burned up, he will suffer loss, though he himself will be saved, but only as through fire. Do you not know that you *(plural)* are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy him. For God's temple is holy, and you are that temple." – First Corinthians 3:15-17

6:9 – "Though we speak in this way, yet in your case, beloved, we feel sure of better things—things that belong to salvation.

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
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- 1. "Even though we speak like this" indicates that the previous argument included real people who had gone back to ritual worship, but was hypothetical in its application to the readers.
- 2. The author of this book does not think his readers are lost or have lost their salvation.
- 3. In fact, he believes they are saved. He doesn't even think they are close.
- 4. Remember the pronouns the writer is using:
 - a. "you" in 5:11, 12
 - b. "us" in 6:1
 - c. "we" in 6:3
 - d. "those" in 6:4
 - e. "your" in 6:9 ("you" 6:10,11,12)
- 5. The writer also believes they are more like the field in verse 6:7 than 6:8
 - a. In verse 6:10 he believes they have done deeds worthy of reward.
 - b. He does fear they have backed away due to fear, opposition, etc.
- 6. "things that accompany salvation" would NOT be getting burned like thorns and thistles.
- 7. Instead "things that accompany salvation" would be:
 - a. Growth
 - b. Discipline
 - c. Production
 - d. Rewards
- 8. These things are all part of the Christian life. The saved person is not in danger of being burned with fire.

6:10 – "For God is not unjust so as to overlook your work and the love that you have shown for his name in serving the saints, as you still do.

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- 1. "work" did not cause salvation but was a result of salvation.
- 2. Notice the Cycle of Christian Life:
 - a. **Salvation** Saved in verse 6:9 "Though we speak in this way, yet in your case, beloved, we feel sure of better things—things that belong to salvation."
 - b. Service Helped and continue to help his people (6:10)
 "For God is not unjust so as to overlook your work and the love that you have shown for his name in serving the saints, as you still do.
 - c. **Work** Changed Life "Work" indicates Christian character (6:10)
 - d. **Love** God "Love" for God indicates a knowledge of God (6:10)



6:11- "And we desire each one of you to show the same earnestness to have the full assurance of hope until the end,

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- 1. "Same diligence to the very end" means they will have to continue to run in the Christian Life Circle to the very end of their lives. They will need to continue:
 - a. Learning of God
 - b. Clothing themselves with Christ
 - c. Serving people
- 2. If they drift away in their knowledge or their application they will drift back toward Judaism.
- "Full Assurance" πληροφοριαν Plerophorian means "full assurance" and is translated as "conviction", confidence" and "full assurance". It is used four times in the GNT (Greek New Testament):
 - a. Colossians 2:1-2 "For I want you to know how great a struggle I have for you and for those at Laodicea and for all who have not seen me face to face that their hearts may be encouraged, being knit together in love, to reach all the riches of <u>full assurance</u> of understanding and the knowledge of God's mystery, which is Christ,
 - b. 1 Thessalonians 1:5 "our gospel came to you not only in word, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with <u>full conviction</u>. You know what kind of men we proved to be among you for your sake."
 - c. Hebrews 6:11 (*here*)
 - d. Hebrews 10:21-23 "Since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us draw near with a true heart in <u>full assurance</u> of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful."
- 4. The idea here is <u>not</u> that they will secure their salvation by doing these things, but that with understanding they will be fully assured of their saved position in Christ and realize their full potential as a son of God.
 - a. A believer who is focused on growth and production with run the Christian race correctly.
 - b. A believer who is not growing and drifting away forgets their status of being in Christ and begin to live aimlessly.
 - c. A believer who is thinks they can lose their salvation are burdened with fears of losing their salvation, burdens to maintain their salvation and, often, hopelessness of doubt (the opposite of full assurance).
- 5. In 5:11 these believers started to drift from learning the word of God ("you are slow to learn").

- a. The result was fragmented understanding of God and his plan.
- b. They had then become confused believers tempted to turn away from Christianity and execute improper living.

6:12- "so that you may not be sluggish, but imitators of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises.





- 1. "Lazy" means "sluggish" and is the same word as 5:11 "slow to learn" ("nwqroi" which means "dull, slow, sluggish")
- 2. "Imitate" mimetai This is where we get our word "mimic".
 - a. It refers to watching and "mimicing" the "winners" in the Christian life live.
 - b. We all "mimic" someone. We need to purposely chose good examples.
 - c. Chapter 11 of Hebrews will give a good list to start with.
- 3. The winners are going to have:
 - a. "Faith" from an understanding of God's Word
 - b. "Patience" which is the application of Christ-likeness to their lives
 - i. Makrothumia meaning "patience", "long-suffering".
 - ii. From two words *makros thymos*:
 - 1. The word *makros* means "long", so by definition this word includes the concept of waiting.
 - 2. Thymos means "passion", "anger"
 - iii. Together this word means "long-passion"
 - iv. It is a characteristic of God ub 1 Peter 3:20 and 2 Peter 3:15
 - v. It is one of the fruit of the spirit in Galatians 5:22
- 4. Result "Inherit what has been promised" which is rewards for service.
 - a. "Inherit" κληρονομουντων kleronomounton which is a verb present active meaning "inherit, obtain acquire by inheritance":
 - i. you are active in "inheriting" now.
 - ii. These believers are currently in the process of receiving the promise of salvation along with the powers and fruit of that salvation.
